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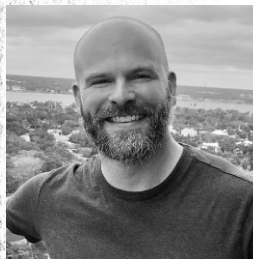

Haydeé Landing Gordon

Born in Santurce, San Juan, in 1956, Landing earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Puerto Rico in 1976 and later moved to Mexico, where she obtained her master's degree from the San Carlos Academy in 1986. After living in Mexico for about ten years, she returned to Puerto Rico to teach Fine Arts at UPR. In 1989, she won the Grand Prix at the XVIII Ljubljana Biennial and received numerous accolades throughout her career, including honorable mentions at various print biennials. Her work has been exhibited globally, including in New York, Spain, and Italy.

From 1989 to 1995, Landing directed the Department of Graphic Arts at the School of Fine Arts of San Juan, emphasizing experimentation with digital technology and non-toxic materials in printmaking. She skillfully combines various techniques, including photopolymer and silk aquatint. Her 2010 exhibition "Espacios" featured digitally altered photographs on fabric and paper, exploring themes of colonization, gender conflict, and cultural survival.

Critics have noted the political depth and sense of despair in her work, especially in exhibitions like "Memoria Colectiva," which reflects on social injustices and human rights.

Her artworks are housed in several prominent institutions in Puerto Rico. In 2010, she resumed her role as director of the Graphic Arts Department at the School of Plastic Arts and Design, retiring in May 2024. Recognized as a master in printmaking, she advocates for the use of non-toxic materials in her art.

The Southern Graphics Council International (SGCI) aims to foster public interest in printmaking and graphic arts. It is the largest printmaking organization in North America, with artists from the United States, as well as international members from places like Canada, South America, Central America, and Europe attending the conference. SGCI shares professional information among artists and like-minded individuals, organizes and promotes exhibitions of prints and graphic arts in educational and arts-focused institutions, and recognizes outstanding contributions to these disciplines through awards. Additionally, it engages and supports artists and communities of diverse backgrounds (including, but not limited to BIPOC, LGBTQIA+, and people with disabilities) in its programming, keeping members and the public informed about relevant activities and news through publications. Its goal is to encourage the study, research, enjoyment, and advancement of printmaking and graphic arts.

In Puerto Rico, printmaking has been one of the most relevant artistic disciplines in shaping the nation's cultural identity. Through techniques like woodcut, lithography, etching, and others, Puerto Rican artists have used this medium to represent social struggles, the island's history, and its landscape, making it an

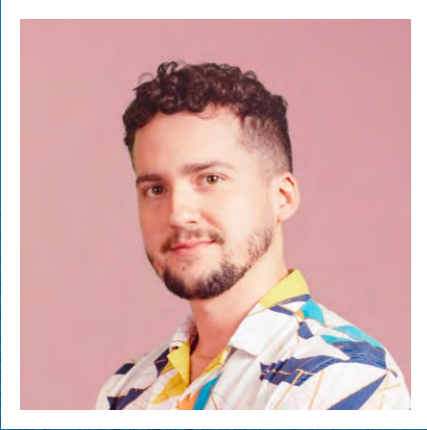
accessible tool for the dissemination of ideas and social critique. Since the foundational contributions of artists in the 1950s, printmaking has played a central role in the development of Puerto Rican art, fostering a visual dialogue that connects generations and reflects the country's cultural and political transformations. However, a mistaken perception that printmaking is a predominantly male field has prevailed. This belief, deeply rooted in tradition, has overshadowed the significant and multifaceted contributions of women artists in this medium. Although many male names have dominated the historical narrative, it is crucial to acknowledge that women have played an equally vital role in the development and evolution of Puerto Rican printmaking.

Set against the captivating backdrop of the city of San Juan, Puerto Rico, SGCI announces PuertoGrabando, an inclusive experience for members and Caribbean printmakers at this conference. In addition to the usual features that define SGCI conferences, such as exhibitions, panels, and demonstrations, PuertoGrabando offers an expanded array of delights that include a new vision of appreciating the vibrant history of printmaking in the Caribbean. Thus, SGCI presents a presidential panel titled "Matriz e identidad: Presencia de la mujer en el grabado

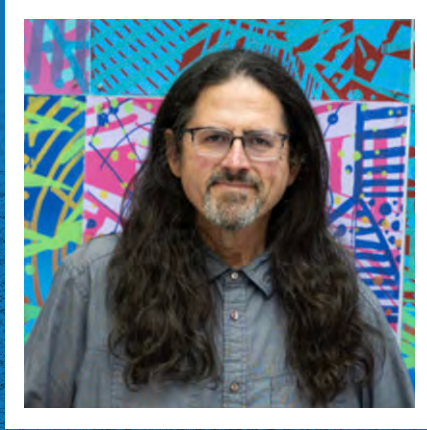
puertorriqueño" which translates to "Matrix and Identity: The Presence of Women in Puerto Rican Printmaking." The panel aims to highlight the impact and diversity of women's voices in Puerto Rican printmaking. This initiative seeks to present perspectives, from pioneering women printmakers who challenged established norms to contemporary artists who continue improving in this field, and how their contributions reflect a unique perspective on Puerto Rican reality.

By highlighting the careers and achievements of women printmakers, this conference panel aims to correct the dominant narrative and offer a more inclusive vision of Puerto Rican printmaking. It focuses on recognizing the legacy of these artists and their influence on the evolution of graphic arts on the island, emphasizing the need for a critical revision of traditional art historiographies that have marginalized their contributions.

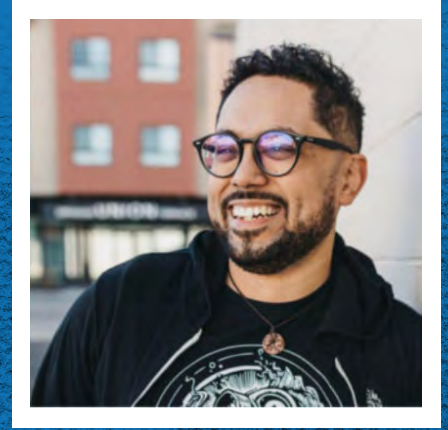

Hello, Print Friend Oaxaca Documentary

Print Friends, this is a very special episode. Last May, Reinaldo and Miranda along with Christian Riquelme traveled to Oaxaca, Mexico to create a documentary about the history of printmaking in the region. The following is a conversation about the process of making the documentary, what it is like to tell such a complex story, our adventures trying to get face time with Shinzaburo Takeda, and what makes Oaxaca so special and a printmaking paradise known the world over.

Wind Whispers

The Wind Whispers project is an innovative and interdisciplinary initiative that aims to amplify the voices of young people in addressing climate change through art and nature. This ongoing project, led by Eszter Sziksz, DLA in collaboration with Dr. Kata Dozsa, utilizes printmaking and natural elements to create a platform for young people aged 16-18 to express their hopes and desires for our collective climate future. Messages collected from young individuals are transformed into art using organic ash and printed on snow in the High Arctic, as well as on lush tropical leaves and the soil of the rainforest in Costa Rica. The ephemeral nature of these messages, carried by the wind and interacting with local fauna, serves as a powerful metaphor for the transient impact of human actions on the environment. This interdisciplinary work has been presented at international conferences, including the International Inter-/Transdisciplinary Conference and will be further showcased at the “Child/youth-friendly Climate Justice: Progress and Opportunities” conference. The project's expansion to Costa Rica demonstrates its global relevance and potential to engage diverse communities in climate justice and sustainability conversations. The Puffin Foundation supports the Wind Whispers project.

Academic programs tend to steer students toward tenure-track positions or independent practice while the larger field of print-related careers operates in the periphery of our awareness. A special attention will be drawn to the scientific research in intaglio and lithographic techniques, including, among others, the non-toxic experiments with eco-lithography and eco-electroetching – the techniques developed at the Lithography Techniques Studio and at the Intaglio Techniques Studio at the Strzemiński Academy of Fine Arts in Łódź.

The Strzemiński Academy of Fine Arts in Łódź has been an important centre for printmaking research in Poland. The Institute of Artistic Printmaking was created in 1971 by three renowned printmakers: Stanisław Fijałkowski, Leszek Rózga and Roman Artymowski who created the first three studios. Today the Institute is composed of 7 studios specialising in different areas of printmaking, run by 7 professors and 7 associate professors. The aim of this paper is to present the results of the research conducted within the last 8 years at two studios: the Intaglio Techniques Studio currently run by the author of this text and by Oskar Gorzkiewicz, PhD and the Lithography Techniques studio conducted by prof. Witold Warzywoda and Tomasz Matczak PhD.

Panelists will share their research into personal, familial, and/or cultural histories, and situate projects within larger political and cultural movements. Chaired by J. Leigh Garcia, this panel will tell the stories of artists working with personal experience, familial histories, and private labor to create artworks that challenge dichotomies of personal/political, private/public, and local/-global. Through their research, artists uncover and affirm the often untold stories of people of color, working-class people, immigrants, and the LGBTQ community. This panel will seek to include a diverse history of artists and a diverse selection of panelists to engage this topic and create an inclusive dialogue. The panelists will share their research and weave it into their artistic projects. Contemporary artists who draw upon autobiographical material and familial histories encompass a diverse array of processes and projects, and the panelists' research will be contextualized within a lineage of artists whose work manifests the idea that the personal is political.

Conference Anarchy: Decentralizing Printmaking Knowledge Through Regional Symposiums will highlight the robust trend of current local symposiums, smaller scale conferences, print fairs, and home-grown print events that eschew the cost and monumentality of national and international printmaking conferences for the more individualized and niche regional meetings.

This panel will offer a diverse group of printmakers involved in organizing smaller, themed, and regional biennials, symposiums, and workshops, presenting on the strengths and challenges of this organizing. Examples may include the Screenprint Biennial symposium or the Zea Mays workshop, highlighting printmaking concepts on a focused theme, or events like Quebec's Trois-Rivières Biennial or Chicago's Grabadolandia that showcase a diversity of language and culture in printmaking. Organizers of print events like Print Santa Fe or Print Austin would be encouraged to share their experiences.

Presenters on the Conference Anarchy panel will argue that the smaller symposiums offer more opportunities for diversity and access, with more affordable meetings, more chances to connect with like-minded artists, and with a lessened climate impact than larger centralized conferences. Concepts like tele-presence and virtual participation could also be discussed.

Artists use ink every day, but seldom think of who made it and what it actually contains. In this era of environmental concerns, artists are now questioning what is in their ink and what is the impact of the ink on the environment. Printmakers need an ink that will stand the test of time and not fade or discolor. They also need to know that if they buy an ink this year, that they can buy the same ink in five years. Twenty years ago the trend was to consider whether artists ink was healthy for the user. Recently concerns for the wider environment have come to the fore. Society is now questioning the future of plastic, petrochemical products and monoculture, each of these occur in the manufacture of commercial printing ink and can occur in some printmaking inks. What this means for the printmaker is a rethink of what type of ink you use and how you might use it? Presentations will include ink manufacture, history of printmaking ink, and two case studies from contemporary printmaking studios.

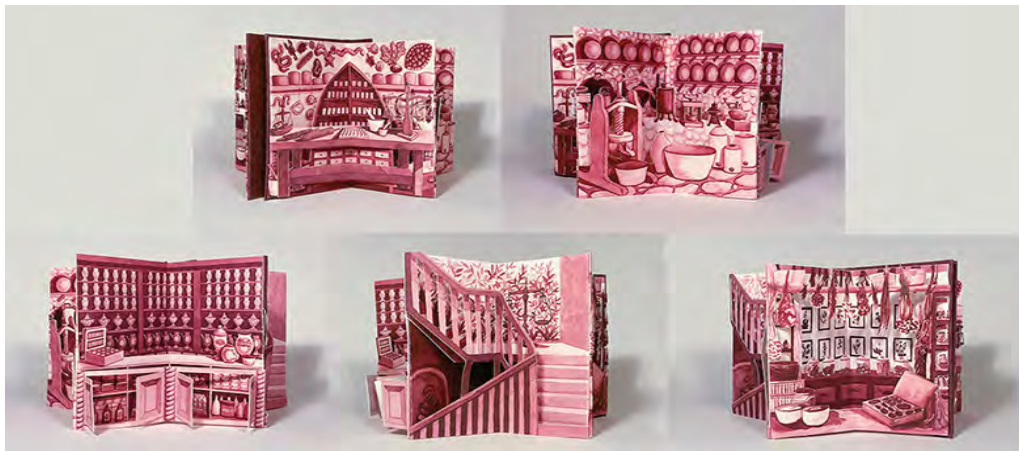

Sea Change: Connecting Printmakers, Climate Change, and Research

Deborah Cornell, Barbara Putnam, and Richard Cornell

Puerto Rico is an island environment, a single point surrounded by a changing ocean and climate. To confront climate changes, sea level rise and possible mass extinctions, artists utilize the interaction of creative disciplines and the embrace of broad scientific research. Print media are flexible communication tools capable of absorbing data, analysis, and image, constructing a bridge between research and public engagement. Conservation and policy change can come from thoughtful, collaborative thinking, considering economic challenges alongside coastal biology, ocean rhythms, and marine ecosystems.

What are the environmental concerns specific to Puerto Rico and how do these issues resonate with the countries represented in the INKubator session?
What interdisciplinary efforts are already taking place and what forms can they take?
How do we connect printmakers interested in conservation, research initiatives, and working for change?

“DIY serves as the honorific term for the kind of subject required by the constant just-in-time turmoil of our networked world. It has come to stand for a potent mix of entrepreneurial agency and networked sociality proclaiming itself heir to both punk autonomy, the notion of living by your wits and as an outsider, and to a sub-cultural basis for authentic artistic production, the assumption that truly creative individuals exist in spontaneously formed social undergrounds.”- Lane Relyea, Welcome to Yourspace

Inspired by Lane Relyea’s concept of do-it-yourself as an art form representing subcultural authenticity, No Office Space aims to discuss how easily accessible printmaking tools can enhance our understanding of both historical and contemporary archives. The focus of this inkubator explores the often overlooked aesthetics in print media through DIY and non-archival processes. Artists will examine how accessible methods in print media- such as xerox printing, risograph, stenciling, and monoprinting— can be used to reinterpret narratives about place, identity, gender, race, and power. Overall, this discussion will consider how under-appreciated printmaking techniques can be used to reclaim narratives within the hierarchies of fine art. It will also discuss how the use of non-archival printmaking processes can reshape our understanding of history and aesthetics, and what new possibilities these create for addressing issues of identity, power, and environmental sustainability.

The Changing Tides

This INKubator session will focus on understanding cultural diversity and celebrating it. The audience will participate in the learning of the history of the conference site, Puerto Rico, and its cultural heritage along with celebrating other cultures seen through the printmaking practices. Rosenda Álvarez Faro’s artistic practice, including her previous involvement in Taller Malaquita, an art collective founded by women artists of San Juan. So get up off the couch (pronounced "cooch"), hold on to your deckles, and step into the splash zone, it's a pulp printing party in Puerto Rico.

I am interested in the word grabado having a double meaning of recording and printmaking. I am also interested in -ando/-endo transforming words into continuous verbs in Spanish like -ing does in English. These book forms create the illusion of movement. The images in the flipbook appear to move because the mind fills in the blanks the eyes do not record. The zoetrope works while it is spinning because the eye retains the image while seeing the next image. It also relies on the slits and the frame to keep the images from blurring together. While not active, the accordion book represents movement in its design.

Tonality in Letterpress Photopolymer

In this demonstration Jennifer Scheuer and Francille Zhuang will present an affordable home-made exposure system using easily-accessible equipment to create exposures for photo-polymer letterpress and discuss strategies for good exposures. Many studios do not have access to a polymer-exposure unit, and this system creates opportunity for an artist to pack the supplies, and create plates while traveling or at artist residencies. Scheuer utilizes letterpress photo-polymer to create paper sculptures and artist books, her interest in this technique allows her to produce large quantities of prints quickly for these intricate works.

Scheuer and Zhuang are researching strategies of translating drawings and washes into tonal plates for letterpress for a current research project and will present examples and strategies to create these works.

New ways in algraphy- from Kitchen litho to temporary laminated matrices

Algraphy is a technique using aluminium and fosforic acid to create the matrix. Kitchen Lithography is a planographic printing technique (printing from a flat surface) based on the principle of water and oil repelling each other. To simplify the algraphy process I will show the participants how to use simple kitchen aluminium foils, pencils, ballpens, permanent markers, wax pastels, bar of soap, and a common non-alcoholic drink to create a printing matrix that can be printed in a regular edition of several copies. As a base to hold the foil we will use grained aluminum plates, textured wallpapers, canvas, e.t.c. The images created this way have an interesting graphic quality. My workshop's aim is to popularise printmaking techniques which can be created by both advanced and beginning artists both at home and in the studio. I will share the results of my experiments with the frottage technique incorporated in the process of creating the matrix.

As an alternative I can propose a demo of eco-lithography with the use of citric acid or repeat the application from 2020 which was accepted then: Experimental lithography techniques from Polish perspective

I will demonstrate a variety of techniques for applying the gouache onto paper, coating the image with india ink as well as the wash off process. I also plan on setting up a station which will be open for participants to create their own small format pieces. This process is relatively quick, so participants will be able to have their own 'painted print' finished within an hour.

Collagraph and Transfer Pressure Printing

This demonstration will explore collagraphy and pressure printing, with a focus on techniques using graphite transfer papers and inked plexi plates. Sok will showcase samples of his work and demonstrate how he creates loose and fixed collagraph plates using various materials and textiles. He will cover inking techniques and transfer printing methods to enhance composition, texture, and detail. Sok will also explain his graphite transfer printing process, including the use of different pressure levels and the creation of colored and custom transfer plates using plexi and Duralar. The objective is to introduce these methods, inspire experimentation, and foster a collaborative environment for sharing artistic ideas.

The main purpose of this demonstration is to show SGCI attendees how to animate prints using digital programs. Digital animation is becoming easier to achieve and can open new doors for expression. I will demonstrate how to import JPEGs of prints to Photoshop and divide the images into layers. The files with those JPEG layers are then imported to MOHO PRO, where one can create a digital skeleton for the selected image. Once you have a workable character, based on a print, you can animate it by using special tools in the Timeframe. Anime Pro is a powerful animation software that provides impressive tools and fast rendering of animated frames. During the demo, I will animate a print and export it as an mp4 digital file. I will also show a selection of finished prints. The whole demo and film presentation will take two hours.

This intaglio Chine-Collé technique allows incorporating multiple colors and/or different image designs— e.g., digitally printed images— on a single matrix, eliminating the need for printing multiple layers. The demonstration will explore Chine-collé within the intaglio printmaking process by using metal and acrylic plates as matrices. The demonstration will share (1) a process preparing printing paper and adhesive for a Chine-collé technique, (2) methods for dyeing and preparing colored paper, and (3) incorporating multiple colors or images in a design requiring tight registration.

DIY Cameras for Printmakers

Combining low tech photography with photomechanical printmaking processes provides an intriguing avenue for the artist/printmaker who either does not naturally gravitate towards traditionally drawn images, or who would like to supplement such imagery with the syntax of rudimentary photography. Alternatives to the sharp quality of a digital camera include homemade pinhole cameras, the likes of which have been made for centuries, as well as single-element lens cameras. This demonstration will showcase possibilities in designing and constructing high quality, low tech DIY cameras using materials and processes common to book arts and printmaking for the purposes of generating photographic negatives to be used in the printmakers workflow. Participants will gain a general understanding of the process of designing, building, and using a well-crafted aesthetically pleasing DIY camera. Examples of the various phases of construction will be displayed. The demonstration will focus on the fundamental considerations of design, including both optimal function as well as aesthetic value of the camera as a tool and as an object. Instruction will be given regarding the use of the camera to generate negatives to be used in photomechanical processes such as collotype and serigraphy in addition to alternative processes such as cyanotype and gum printing. Examples of such work will be provided.
